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Foreword

"The Covid pandemic has been incredibly challenging and it may be some time before we understand the full impact. However, it has been good to see the strength of the recovery in UK film and I'm incredibly proud of the determination, resilience and vision shown by our industry in getting things back on track and the role ScreenSkills' has played in that.

"During the lockdowns, we at ScreenSkills quickly stepped up to adjust our plans to support the industry through the constantly changing circumstances. We delivered training and masterclasses online, created e-learning modules and worked with colleagues on guidelines to enable all to return safely to production. Some of the lessons of the last year or so will continue to be of value as offering training online has the benefit of providing opportunities regardless of geography.

"There are skills shortages to be addressed now but we also keep an eye on the skills needs of the future and the shifting landscape of content creation. There is increasing convergence in the worlds of high-end TV and film and ambitious and innovative use of tech in areas such as virtual production. We are commissioning training to ensure the UK has enough people with the right skills to take advantage of these developments.



"Other longstanding challenges remain. We remain focused on developing a more diverse and inclusive workforce, helping talent from across the whole of the country to enter the industry, progress in it and thrive. For example, we launched Film Forward, a programme which supports experienced Black, Asian or minority ethnic professionals to advance into more senior roles.

"It's great to see how our interventions can help talent to develop. Charanprite Dhami, formerly a ScreenSkills Trainee Finder trainee, contacted me recently to share the news that she's now working as a 3rd AD. A second cohort of students has recently graduated from our Centre of Screen Excellence in Yorkshire, with two-thirds of the graduates having secured industry jobs since. The awarding of bursaries has given countless people the chance to take control of their own careers by supporting the training they want to take or with investment in key kit or equipment to help them move forward.

"On a personal level, it's also been fulfilling to see the successes of some of those I have mentored in the last year. I couldn't recommend this way of investing in the future of the industry more. No matter your career stage or area of expertise, there is always going to be someone that will benefit from your guidance.

"It is now, more than ever, important that we keep investing in the future of the workforce. That's why I urge you to contribute to the Film Skills Fund. In 2020-21, thanks to industry contributions, we were able to invest around £700,000 in skills training for professionals across the whole of the UK alongside National Lottery funds awarded by the BFI. Contributors can access a brilliant band of subsidised Trainee Finder trainees, but it is most importantly an investment in the future. This is critical if the UK is to remain a destination of choice for film production."

About ScreenSkills

ScreenSkills is the industry-led skills body for the UK's screen industries - animation, film, games, television, immersive technology and VFX.

We manage the Film Skills Fund and have invested more than £15 million in skills and training for UK film production, distribution and exhibition since it was established in 1999.

Films that have contributed to the fund include: Downton Abbey 2, Matilda, 1917, Rocks, The Father, Mogul Mowali, Jurassic World: Dominion, Black Widow, Cruella, The Railway Children Return, Mothering Sunday, Saint Maud, Tuesday, Together, Pretty Red Dress, Persuasion, The Eternal Daughter, Benediction, The Origin and Men.

We also lead the delivery of the BFI's Future Films Skills strategy, investing National Lottery funds, and receive funding from Arts Council England to share best practice. All these streams of income are crucial in enabling us to tackle skills shortages and to improve diversity and inclusion in the workforce.

Careers outreach

We offer comprehensive online careers information about roles in the screen industries and the pathways in. We work with partners to reach new entrants, parents, guardians, teachers and careers advisers.

Our activity includes:

- **Open Doors:** introductory panel and networking sessions for new entrants and career changers to get careers advice from industry experts.
- Set Ready: taster events available across the UK to give talented new entrants an overview of the wide range of behind-thecamera roles.
- Careers events: we attend careers events and skills shows across the UK to inspire and inform diverse young talent. We also host events for careers advisers and are a partner in **Discover! Creative Careers**

We have also created resources, accessible for all, to help talent find out more about roles in screen. This includes:

- Job profiles and career maps: information about behind-the-camera jobs and how to get in, starting with the relevant A-levels, Highers or vocational qualifications.
- Immersive experience: First Day: On Set and First Day: In Post are two VR experiences - also available as 360-degree videos that show what a day on set and in post are like.

Find Your Future in Film and TV

Find your Future in Film and TV is a nationwide initiative to recruit new and diverse talent into the UK's screen industries.

The campaign features talent talking about their behind-the-camera roles and how they managed to enter the industry.

The 30-second films have run in cinemas across the UK since May 2019 and are being shown as part of the Harry Potter Studio Tour in Leavesden.

New entrant and transferers

Trainee Finder

<u>Trainee Finder</u> is a paid placement scheme which matches trainees with productions to offer proper on-the-job work experience.

The year-long programme includes training courses and industry masterclasses on issues such as health and safety and set etiquette to prepare successful candidates for working in film and to improve their employability.

Since its launch, trainees have worked on numerous feature films including 1917, Rocks, Persuasion, The Favourite, Wild Rose and Fantastic Beasts: The Crimes of Grindelwald.

To be eligible to receive trainees from Trainee Finder, productions must pay in to the **Film Skills Fund**. In return, the scheme will contribute £300 per week towards a trainee's salary for up to six months of their placement.

In 2020/21/22 we have 136 trainees in departments including accounts, art department, assistant director, camera, costume, editorial, hair and make-up. locations, production office, sound, video assist and VFX.

Of these, 71% are women, 62% from outside London and 24% from a Black, Asian or minority ethnic background.

Skills transfer programmes

We run programmes that aim to tackle skills shortages identified by the industry by taking advantage of existing expertise the in the local workforce. Potential candidates will be offered and introduction to the screen industries with a view to helping them find roles on productions. Examples of skills transfer programmes are Skills to Screen and Veterans in Focus.

Film Forward

Film Forward is a new initiative designed to create change in the UK film industry by supporting experienced Black, Asian or minority ethnic professionals to advance into more senior roles.

The programme will match film professionals who have at least five years' experience in a variety of below-the-line roles with paid opportunities which will also include professional coaching and access to a bursary of up to £3,000 to help with expenses needed to enable career progress.

Short courses

ScreenSkills invests in short courses to support professionals to develop in their careers. Investment is informed by findings of the ScreenSkills Skills Forecasting Service

In 2021/22 we are investing in training for production accountants, production managers, production coordinators, art directors, data driven marketing, and transferers in hair and make-up.

We are also investing in VFX compositing. VFX digital matte painting and post-supervision for film for disabled talent. Visit screenskills.com/training to find out more about the training that we currently run.

Courses we have funded in the last three years include:

- First Aid for Film Freelancers (Mission Accomplished): sessions covering learning skills on leadership, financial, management, career development and gaining new clients for freelancers.
- Unconscious Bias Training (BIFA): encompassing many different workshops and sessions about how to deal with unconscious bias in the film workplace.
- Online leadership sessions (TRC Media): sessions on how to learn to lead yourself, bearing in mind boundaries, personal development and mental health.
- Movie Magic scheduling and budgeting (Sgil Cymru): practical course on how to work with the different Movie Magic software.
- Women future leaders in distribution and exhibition (Birds' **Eye View):** a leadership training programme for women, and those who identify as women with distribution experience and who have the ambition to run or own a distribution business or operate at a higher executive level.
- Afro Hair Essentials (Creative Media Skills Institute): online, practical afro hair essentials course led by an experienced trainer in afro hair.
- Mindset (Ffilm Cymru Wales): training developed to initiate a conversation around mental health barriers in the hope that participating screenwriters will feel empowered and encouraged to progress despite these challenges and inspire others to do the same.
- Data Driven Marketing (Independent Cinema Office): A professional network of peers specialising in digital marketing

- for film exhibition to share industry understanding.
- Making it Possible (Raising Films): one-day personal development course with follow-up online support to help experienced professionals navigate their way back into the industry after a caring break and helps those who have already returned but feel their career has stagnated.
- Social Media Marketing for Films and Filmmaking (Taylor Kerek): Course designed to help screen professionals use social media professionally.

Being able to apply what I've learnt so far with my previous experience in the film industry has definitely set me down a path, in my mind, towards VFX producing that previously was not available to me, starting with this co-ordinating role on a large-scale feature."

- Film On (104 Films): 12 disabled course participants were trained to become camera trainees/assistants.
- Script Supervision (GBCT): the course explored the core skills all good continuity/script supervisors must have.
- **Production Finance Market New Talent Strand/Market Place Live (Film London):** the Production Finance Market's New Talent strand offered international financiers the chance to connect with a curated selection of the most promising emerging feature filmmakers from the UK and abroad.

Bursaries

ScreenSkills bursaries are designed to provide financial assistance to those looking to enter, progress in, return to, or transfer into the screen industries.

Individuals can apply for a bursary if:

- You can demonstrate proven professional working experience in the UK screen industries
- You have been accepted onto an eligible training course
- You currently work in the UK screen industries or can demonstrate your intention to work in the UK screen industries.
